Police believe the incident is connected to an earlier stabbing, say it is not terror related.

## New virtual boundary app being trialled in SA will alert to vineyard pests

Trials of a new smartphone app aimed at protecting vineyards from pests and diseases is being trialled in South Australia.

The Project Boundary Rider monitoring system is being overseen by Vinehealth Australia at vineyards in the Barossa Valley and McLaren Vale.

Vinehealth Australia technical manager Suzanne McLoughlin said it placed a virtual fence around vineyards, tracking the movement of people and pests via GPS on a smartphone.

She said one feature will be the provision of an upto-date visitor record, which would also provide information about the vineyard.

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"When someone walks onto a property, they get a

message and that notification on their phone will basically welcome them to the property and provide them with requirements that need to be followed," Ms McLoughlin said.

"That might be ringing the vineyard manager to let them know they are there, signing in at the office or dipping their feet, if that is required."

Ms McLoughlin said the app could also alert those in the industry of any breakouts that could affect vineyards.

"The app also has the ability to enable broadcast messages to be sent out," she said.

"For example, if we were to find an outbreak of a particular pest or disease in a particular area, we can actually very quickly broadcast a message out to everybody — or to all the users of this app — that something has been found and what practices need to be put in place."
